### Whose Church is it Anyway?

The church is the *ekklēsia*, literally, the "called-out group." We are not people called *above* others, but called-*out* from among others; not because we're better but because God has chosen us for a specialized role *on behalf of* all others, namely, to be God's partners to bless all the families of the earth (**Gen 12:3; Acts 3:25**).

The church is a local assembly of the followers of Jesus. It is the Body of Christ, members of the Lord and of one another. The people of the church think of each other with the familial titles "brother and sister," which accentuates their inseparable connec-

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tion to each other. They are a group of people who know each other face to face and share life together in immediate and tangible ways. They gather together regularly (congregation = those who congregate) for worship, fellowship, teaching, the celebration of Christ-instituted practices (among Anabaptists, the Lord's Supper and baptism), and for economic sharing as any have need. Then they disperse to serve the Lord with a view to assembling again soon. This definition of church has been consistent from the beginning and throughout the ages in all places and among all denominations of the faith.

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Can you be a Christian and not be part of a local church? To be sure we all belong to something larger than any one particular assembly, the world-wide fellowship of believers, the "church universal." This global affiliation and unity is very important but it is not sufficient. By definition one can't practice Christian faith by *only* being a part of the world-wide body and not being part of a local body. The identity of the church as an assembly of the followers of Jesus who share life and mission together remains primary.

Can we compassionately make allowances for people who face challenges when it comes to assembling? Yes! Hospitals and nursing homes don't close on Sundays and the staff may include Christian people; they can't make it to church every Sunday. The same is true for many other jobs which include travel, labor intense work, responding to emergencies, and weekend duties.

In addition there are people who have or are caring for someone with a disability. There are other people who suffer from a clinical-level of anxiety about being in crowds and so church and other public gatherings are very threatening. There are people who are unusually susceptible to infection and so church is not possible. In our later years health and the ability to travel naturally reduce our ability to attend church. Perhaps the most sensitive category of all and the one calling for the most compassion is people who have been hurt by the church and are no longer part.

More difficult to answer are Christians who are not part of a congregation because they are disheartened by the short-comings of the church. They may see the history of the church as a continual series of compromises, from the simple-living and other-serving group of Jesus' disciples and the fledgling congregations of Acts, to more internally-focused and self-serving "institutional religion." Their critique has some truth and value. Pastors today are usually salaried employees with retirement accounts and healthcare coverage. We don't find that in the Book of Romans! Many (although not all) American congregations own buildings and grounds whose continual upkeep absorbs much of the resources that would otherwise be available for outreach. Long-established churches tend to develop patterns that resist change ("we've always done it that way") and can sometimes be out of touch with reality. Finally, some people level at the church the charge of hypocrisy—that we don't act in ways that are consistent with what we claim to believe. In a mean-spirited age all institutions are liable to the charge of hypocrisy, but the church is an especially vulnerable target because of the high standards of morality and ethics and integrity by which it claims to live.

While these challenges are considerable, they do not change the foundational premise that the church is a local assembly of the followers of Jesus who share life and mission together.

While we know the definition of church, church has always been influenced by the society around it. In our case, present-day American culture predisposes everyone to regard church as a consumer product. We even use that language: "I'm shopping for a church." Visiting and trying out various congregations to determine one that "fits" has some legitimacy. Yet our pervasive consumer perspective produces significant distortion of the meaning of church. People can expect church to work like an appliance; they pay for it (through offerings) and they expect it to do what they want (because they're the owners). If it doesn't do what they want, they discard the item and look to purchase another "product" that does what it should. This is a far cry from being Christ's body and members of one another.

American Christians are not alone in experiencing cultural influences that threaten to distort the meaning of church. The relationship of church and government is one difficulty that faces congregations in every culture.

The central challenge for the church, in any age, in any place, on any issue, is always the same. The challenge for the church is always the challenge of *identity*. Who are we? Who is the church? What do the Scriptures say about who the church is? And what is Christ, the Lord of the church, calling us to be? That is to say that the real challenge for the church is never a challenge posed from outside of it. It is always a challenge posed from within. In any age, any place, on any issue, the challenge for the church is always the same. It is the challenge of *identity*—who are we?

Alongside remembering that the church is a local assembly of the followers of Jesus, there is one other foundational element to our *identity*. That other central component is this: The church belongs to Jesus Christ. He is the Lord of the church. It is *his* church.

That the church is *Christ's* church is so obvious that it may seem unnecessary to say. Yet in my experience most Christians, including myself, tend to act like it's *my* church.

Remembering that its *Christ's* church and not *my* church calls us back to our foundational identity. If it's *my* church, I can pursue what *I* want. If it's *your* church, you can pursue what *you* want. If its Christ's church, we pursue what *Christ* wants, which is neither what *I* want nor what *you* want, neither *my* preference nor *your* preference.

The church belongs to Christ. He is the church's Lord, that is, Sovereign Ruler. The church is a monarchy.

It is not a democracy where members lobby for

what they want or vote to determine what the majority of members want. In the end, what *we* want does not matter. We seek to obey the Lord of the church to whom the church belongs. We submit to the guidance of the Holy Spirit, for the Breath of God to help us discern what Christ wants. Jesus said to Peter, "On this rock I will build *my* church."

What assembles at 401 18<sup>th</sup> Avenue is *Christ's* church. That realization calls us back to our foundational identity: (1) The local assembly of Jesus' followers; (2) Submission to the Lord of the assembly and the need to discern and distinguish God's will from ours.

# A foretaste of the feast

While teaching a group of First Communion students about the Lord's Supper, a pastor gave each child one M&M's candy at the beginning of class. "Eat


it!" he invited, before proceeding to teach.

Near the end of the session the pastor asked the students what they'd thought of the earlier treat. "Good!" said one. "I wanted more!" another admitted. "I wanted a whole bag!" chimed in a third.

"Now you understand another thing about Holy communion," the pastor said. He drew out of his supplies a full bag of M&M's for each student.

"Sometimes we call Communion 'a foretaste of the feast to come." 


### **Job Opportunity**



- Tub of brown frosting
- Shredded coconut
- Green food coloring
- Chocolate Hostess Ding Dong cupcake
- Donut hole
- Pretzel sticks
- M&M's candies

# What you do:

- 1. Bake cake in rectangular pan. When cool, frost it.
- 2. Pour coconut into bowl. Add drops of green food coloring. Mix until coconut resembles grass.
