"Though the Earth should change" (Psalm 46:3) Adapting to Climate Change

In May 2013 I attended my cousin's graduation from college. It was a wonderful celebration! My "older" cousin (by 29 days, which I never let her forget) graduated from Eckerd College in St. Petersburg, Florida. The graduation ceremony was held outside on the college grounds. The Gulf-coast campus was stunningly beautiful that day, covered with palm trees, groves

of hibiscus, Bougainvillea and bird of paradise, and with the scent of honeysuckle in the humid air.

The commencement speaker was Bill McKibben. He is an environmental jour-

nalist, educator and activist. McKibben began his remarks by saying how privileged he was to be present with Eckerd's 50th graduating class. There was enthusiastic applause. Next he said that if the current environmental conditions continue, the 100th commencement will not be held at this location; that's because it will be under water. There was a collective groan.

There are two wrong ways to take McKibben's statement. First, it could be taken to mean that we know the time table of the effects of climate change (like rising ocean levels) with precision. Not true. Second, it could be taken to mean that the effects of climate change will not arrive for another 50 years. Definitely not true.

In fact I have seen a shift in the scientific studies and popular reporting about climate change in approximately the last fifteen years. In short, this is the shift: The effects of climate change are not conditions which will be *arriving* sometime in the future. Rather, the effects of climate change *are here*.

Consider for example Wichita Falls, Texas. Wichita Falls is currently reprocessing sewage for drinking water. The process is thorough and the resulting water is safe. The reason for this rather drastic measure is that Wichita Falls is experiencing its worst drought on record, that is, in over a hundred years, and its reservoirs have shrunk to alltime-low levels. Rain fall is four feet below normal. A number of other municipalities are watching Wichita Falls carefully, anticipating that they may have to follow suit.

Consider for example Miami, Florida. The effects of climate change in Miami are the opposite of Wichita Falls. Ocean levels surrounding the east-coast metropolis have risen so much that sea water is creeping onto Miami's streets. The city is installing massive pumps to return the sea water to the Atlantic. If scientists are correct, this adaptation to climate change is only the beginning for Miami.

But some people are not so sure that climate change is for real. For one thing the "symptoms" can appear confusing. For instance, if we're supposed to be experiencing global *warming* how come 2014 gave the northeastern United States one of its coldest and snowiest winters in a century?

Others believe we should speak of climate *cycles* rather than climate *change*. After all, we got through the hot, dry Kansas summers of 2011 and 2012. Those kinds of years just come around every once in a while and then we go back to something more "normal."

For still others climate change feels like something quite remote. On the news we may hear about scientists drilling ice cores in Greenland or a piece of Antarctica breaking off into the ocean. We may be aware that Bangladesh is creating schools, libraries, clinics, and businesses on boats because more and more of the country is flooded. We may even be aware of the Keeling Curve, an important study that shows the dramatic rise in carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere over the last 60 years—a rise that is progressive and not cyclical.

I give you my opinion: First, skeptics are helpful: They keep the good guys honest. Second, whether this or that specific event is the direct result of climate change may be debatable. However, the overall reality that climate change is occurring is certain. The evidence is superabundant, multi-disciplinary, and thoroughly documented. While its effects are varied, unpredictable, and sometimes even seemingly contradictory, climate change *is* happening and no credible scientist disputes that. There's more \rightarrow

Whenever I am tempted to doubt the reality of climate change, I simply remember when I was seven years old. That year I got a globe for Christmas. It was a special globe with a light bulb inside. In my room at night all the countries of the world glowed for my imagination. The USSR was bright yellow. And there in the middle of the land of our enemies, was a huge inland body of water called the Aral Sea. Globes today, lighted or not, no longer show the Aral Sea because it's gone. It evaporated.

The church rightly asks, "Is climate change an issue for *Christian* action?" I believe the answer is "yes" for a number of reasons. First, God has made a promise of committed and life-giving relationship with all the members of creation, from snail to whale (Gen 9:9-17). Second, God has made a promise to maintain a continuing cycle of growing and dormant seasons. This includes regular sunlight, darkness, heat, cold, rainfall and self-renewing soil to sustain God's creation (Gen 8:22). Third, church agencies like MCC and MDS are increasingly dealing with natural disasters and environmental refugees whose plight is most probably linked to climate change.

Beyond that, addressing climate change is part of the church's prophetic role. Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "The church is the conscience of society." The church has the responsibility of addressing leaders and populations with truth. This includes the exercise of foresight and speech that is forthright.

Responsibility for addressing climate change requires a long-range view of things; the ability to put something on the front burner whose consequences may be sooner or later, two years or 50 years from now, beyond our lifetime or next Thursday.

Churches can encourage families and communities to learn about climate change and its effects. They can encourage participation in reuse and recycling projects, and in all efforts to reduce dependency on fossils fuels.

Churches can encourage research, invention and production of clean and renewable sources of energy for manufacturing, to heat and cool our homes, and to power our vehicles; energy sources that do not have such dire consequences for the earth.

Churches can encourage local and national governments to adopt Earth-sustainable policies, and to participate in international initiatives to address climate change.

The May 2014 issue of *The Mennonite* mentioned that Albuquerque Mennonite Church has adopted as its mission something they call "Watershed Discipleship." This congregation is committed to living sustainably as part of its regional eco-system. Practically this includes commitments to support local food sources, use alternative transportation when possible, and reduce their "carbon footprint."

Above all, addressing climate change is a Christian mission because of who God is. In the Old Testament, God identifies himself as the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The LORD is an intergenerational God who makes promises to people and their descendants after them. In the New Testament, the Good News of Jesus Christ is a promise "for you, for your children, and for all who are far away" (Acts 2:39).

We at Eden worship this God of intergenerational promises. And as the people of God, we too care about the future generations and the Earth they will live on.

This month we will celebrate Children's Day. We will dedicate our new playground. One thing we can say for sure: Our children and grandchildren who are climbing and sliding on the new equipment, and who will be around for Eckerd College's 100th commencement, will not be *awaiting* the effects of climate change; they will be *adapting* to them.

Minutes from the Eden Leadership Team (ELT)

The Eden Leadership Team met Saturday, May 9, 2014 at 9:00 at the church office.

The candle was lit to start the meeting. Bret, in Jeff's absence opened the meting with Devotions. Ephesians 4:16 was read. There was a short time of silence and Bret closed with prayer.

The financial reports were discussed. Expenses are \$20,000.00 more than budget and \$30,000.00 more than expenses. There was an unbudgeted expense for \$14,000.00 for heating and cooling repairs. The Stewardship Commission is going to meet with Everance to work on a budget and Stewardship initiative.

Staff Relations and Deacons are working on job descriptions.

Trustees filled in the dirt around the graves in preparation for Memorial Day. 20 lights will be replaced with LED bulbs that will last 50,000 hours at a cost of \$14,000.00. This will be taken out of the Trustees Capital Fund. They have been ordered but are not in yet. A computer board for the AC/Heating unit at a cost of \$13,000.00 was also replaced.

Children's Day activities were discussed. Pastor Derek and Katie Gillmore are working on the plans for that day. The SEEDS class will be preparing the meal.

Peace/ Witness Commission is looking into ways of supporting our three ladies that are going into VS. They are Lizzie Schrag, Marike Stucky and Alyssa Schrag. The total cost to support them is \$11,000.00. Money may be given to Peace /Witness Commission and they will channel it to the right place.

Worship Commission is working on job descriptions. The theme for the sermons will be "Walking with God" They will be choosing different themes and possibly adding personal stories.

The office secretary position was discussed. A half time position was favored. This will be negotiated and brought to the ELT and then to the congregation. The hours would be consistent and possibly one evening a week would be a possibility with a volunteer manning the office. They could answer the phone and take messages. This all needs to be discussed.

The Education/Discipleship Commission is looking into opportunities for Wednesday night options. Could small groups be an option?

The Pictorial Directory was discussed. The pictures on the wall idea was favored. Printing in house directory is still an option.

Instead of having to study that textbook, you can pick up some books that take you away to another place and/or time. The following two books meet that criteria, but you may also find that you have learned something too.

Does this book title intrigue you? Have you always wanted a simpler, more direct reading of the Anabaptist/Mennonite story without having to plow through some longwinded college history text? Canadian

Mennonite author, Margaret Epp, has conceived and has created, in novel form, a history about our spiritual ancestors and how their lives are affected as they "chose a radical spiritual pilgrimage that separated them from many around them." Epp leads us through actual episodes beginning with the year of 1537 during the Spanish Inquisition on through the 20th century. Face the power of the Church as it controls compliant governments and understand how Anabaptists were the first to realize the importance of the "Separation of Church and State."

Follow the actual storyline and experience real dangers or applaud the quiet and growing under-ground resistances as the movement attracts more followers. Of special interest are the true descriptions of the customs, family dynamics, clever ways of avoiding the authorities' scrutiny, and always, of their faith in God even if they had to pay the final costs when refusing to recant. Read how a Spanish courtier finds Dutch relatives and becomes Anabaptist, how Swiss prisoners are spirited away escaping trial and certain death. Alas, their love of God, service to the sick and poor, and family loyalties do convict a daughter and father as heretics and to death, giving rise to the title, "*Chariots in the Smoke.*"

This Waldo Preheim memorial, listed in the Fiction section, is an easy reading print, 1990 edition, has apparently had only light circulation. Access to a map of Europe helps to work through the geography covered by this story. Read carefully the author's Foreword which ably states her purpose and sets the scene for the events to follow. Finally, as you lay down this book, may you enjoy clearer historical insights and grow in gratitude for the legacy that is ours to continue. Sadly, little has changed through the years—: "IAM MALALA," the memoir of a very young Pakistani girl whose father made it possible for her to get an education, thereby threatening the powers of the entrenched authorities, and was targeted by the Taliban. Although the attempt failed, gravely wound-



ing her, their family was forced to flee their homeland and have found refuge in England. Read the story & google Wikipedia for the world's response to her nearmartyrdom. Shelved in the Bio section.
