Di is OK with me being dirty since she says I clean up pretty good. I enjoy all kinds of music except rap (my grandkids may help correct that deficiency). I've always dressed up for business and when I'm preaching. I've flown well over a million miles in my work and rubbed shoulders with many amazing people along the way. An example was arranging for my Scripture Press colleagues to visit President Carter teaching his Sunday school class in Washington DC.

My favorite movies include "Chariots of Fire," "Dead Poets Society," "Out of Africa" and "City Slickers." This movie motivated me and my brother to join an authentic 1870's cattle drive in southwest Colorado about ten years ago. I wouldn't try that anymore today. I still watch Lawrence Welk, Doc Martin and Downton Abbey on Public Television with Di when possible. I enjoy NASCAR racing and cheer for Danika Patrick since Mark Martin has retired. Di and I each suited up to ride several laps around the Daytona Speedway at 165 mph in Richard Petty racecars on my 70th birthday. I love big trucks and have ridden cross country to the Bronx food market just to sleep in the sleeper, use the trucker's showers and eat in the reserved section with other gear jammers. I'm still a die-hard fan of Chicago sports teams and the University of Southern California Trojans.

A special trip with Di was our 5 weeks in Poland two summers ago for a heritage tour and service project with the Krakow YMCA. The "dessert" was several days in St. Petersburg to absorb some early Russian history including the original painting of "The Return of the Prodigal" in the Hermitage, lunch with a Russian family on our anniversary, and many other cultural and religious highlights. God has certainly been good to me despite some significant struggles along the way including a devastating divorce after 32 years of marriage. I'm grateful to my home church in California, my seminary, First Mennonite Church of Denver and the Western District Conference for assisting in my recovery from that experience and my return to the pastorate. I've sensed God's leading in joining the pastoral team here at Eden and pray God's guidance and blessing on our ministry together in the coming months.

Transportation Updates needed for MDS

The Kansas Mennonite Disaster unit currently owns, operates and maintains the following equipment: 1995 Ford van, 1998 Ford van, and a 2003 Ford truck.

It was suggested in the fall of 2013 that a van replacement fund be started and we plan to replace one or both of the vans currently in our fleet. Both vans have 190,000 miles on them and have been very well maintained and currently are used to transport volunteers to various locations in the United States and Canada.

Since we started keeping track in 2004, these vans have been driven a total of 179,791 miles, transporting 1,185 volunteers. Over the past decade, time that volunteers have donated is valued at around a million dollars.

We are actively seeking funding for the replacement of either or both vans to help us continue the ministry that the Kansas Mennonite Disaster Service unit has been a part of since 1950.

Greetings from Alyssa Schrag in Serbia Excerpts from her newsletter

Belgrade is a beautiful city, although I wouldn't say in the typical sense. It certainly doesn't look like Rome or Paris, but it still has beauty all the same. Belgrade means "White City," named for the stones from which the

Kalemegdan fortress was built. I'd say it's a fitting name because the city lacks color. You can tell which buildings were built in the socialist style; very grey, plain, and in my opinion, ugly. I think certain people of Belgrade have taken it upon themselves to add a little color to this white city. I've enjoyed seeing the different graffiti and have started a collection of photos. Everywhere I look there is history.

The language is hard. There are seven different cases, (nominative, accusative, dative, etc.) each of which change the way that words end. So far that has been the hardest part for me, but there are also a few difficult pronunciations. But regardless of the difficulty, it's been a lot of fun, and I feel as though I'm doing pretty well. My favorite word so far is stvarno, which means "really." It has come in handy with the kindergartners.

My placement is at Noah's Ark Kindergarten. It has animals! Work, as expected, has been tough. It's not always easy to communicate with children when, well...you can't communicate with them. The first week my vocabulary was almost nothing, so even the most basic things were hard to communicate to the children. I relied heavily on my fellow teachers. Now I've even able to have very simple conversations and understand when they tell me they have to go to the bathroom.

Noah's Ark lives up to it's name. When I arrived it had one chicken, one guinea pig, and a few fish. Now it has one chicken, eight chicks, one guinea pig, even more fish, and a hamster! The children get to hold and play with the animals, and help us feed them and clean their cages.

We have about 20 children at the kindergarten who vary in age between 2-6 years old, (Our youngest just turned two in October). In the morning we have circle time with all age groups where we sing songs and teach lessons based off of the theme of the month. After circle time we break into smaller groups, usually by age, and have activities such as arts and crafts workshops, sports, playtime, music, chess lessons, Serbian language (like phonics), and English.

Although it's often hard to communicate, and I've definitely got a learning curve with my lack of education background, it's also been fun as well. It's always a pleasant surprise when a kid will run up to me and say something in English. How Cool! And there is nothing better than when I walk through the doors in the morning to have a child shout my name and give me a big hug.

Oh the food! Yum! If you are a meat-and-potatoes kind of person, Serbia is for you. I've tried all kind of different foods here and it's all so good! An interesting fact about Serbian cuisine, though, is that they don't really like to mix sweet and savory so a peanut butter and jelly sandwich would be unheard of. Sweet jam with salty peanut butter? That's crazy!

I will admit that I miss some foods from back home. It's hard to find cheese that melts well - there isn't a whole lot of plain and simple cheddar. Chocolate chips; also not a thing. I've started buying chocolate bars and mashing them into pieces to do my baking. BUT the thing I miss most is Mexican food. I'm sure missing the delicious and ginormous Mission Burritos in San Francisco right now, not to mention fresh avocados.

Spiritual Life: There is no Mennonite church in Serbia, which gives me a chance to explore other methods of worship. I live above Holy Trinity Pentecostal church, so for the first month I headed down two flights of stairs and listened to the sermon through English translation. I decided to branch out of my building and see what else Belgrade had to offer. My first stop: St. Mary's Anglican church. I chose to go to this church first because it is English speaking. I had never been to an Anglican service, and I rather enjoyed it! The best part of church, is how welcoming everyone has been. It's also an interesting and international group. Serbia's population is majority Orthodox, so I'm also very excited to attend an Orthodox service.

I had the delightful surprise of getting to host my former MVS roommate and current MCC service worker in Palestine, Sara Brubacher. My boyfriend, Evan, visited and we adventured to Derlap National Park.
