As I've grappled with the message of Revelation recently, I'm captivated by Jesus' statement that, "I'm coming soon" and the phrase "In the last days," which appear often in connection with eschatology or the study of the end times.

Year of the Bible

Paul tells Timothy that "in the last days there will be very difficult times," II Tim. 3:1. Many may feel that what's happening in our world and nation today might suggest that these could be the last days, just as some of our Anabaptist ancestors felt in the 16th Century. And that Christ might be coming soon, as Claas Epp and his followers concluded in the 1890s. Or consider Corrie ten Boom's question of me as we visited in her home in Amsterdam: "Do you actually believe that the tribulation spoken of in Revelation could be worse than what we all experienced during the Holocaust?"

Even Paul's description of "difficult times" of the "last days" hardly compares with the suffering and brutality in the Middle East and elsewhere in our own day. He speaks of people who "love only themselves and their money, are boastful and proud, scoffing at God, disobedient to their parents and ungrateful." "They consider nothing sacred, will be unloving and unforgiving, will slander others and have no self-control; they will be cruel and have no interest in what is good, will betray their friends, will be reckless, puffed up with pride, love pleasure rather than God, and will act as if they are righteous but reject the power that could make them godly." These are the very kinds of conditions that the seven churches in Rev. 1-3 were struggling with as John gave them his vision of the future. And how many of us have witnessed this kind of behavior around us in our own settings today as well?

Since Jesus said that only the Father knows the day and hour when He would return, we can only conclude that what we're experiencing is no different from what has transpired in past history. And to remember that through it all, God still loves us and wants his very best for us. He asks us repeatedly not to fear and assures us that he will not give us more than we can handle. Because we can do all things through Christ who will strengthen us, and that great things await those who remain faithful. The book of Revelation gives us perspective on dealing with the challenges we face today as well. And helps us avoid getting caught up in the pessimism of the day and begin behaving like the world around us.

We have a hope and unique spiritual resources to model love for others and confidence in God, and to radiate the transforming, sustaining power of Christ as our purpose and motivation in life. Which is why I feel we need to take a step back, slow down, put a hold on some programs and find more time to reflect on the basics of our faith. On Bible study and prayer, on deep sharing with and ministry to people near us, and in seeking the direction that God would have us to go. We're so focused on the forest that is dying that we don't notice the individual trees that are suffering and contributing to that death. Everyone seems to be searching for that just right seminar, simple fix or local strategy that might correct the issues in our own congregations or denomination.

I believe this is true in our local settings, in our Western District Conference, the Mennonite Church USA, and even in our church planting strategies. As we debate what true faith is and what being missional means and looks like for us in today's world. I certainly want to keep hope in my messages and lifestyle, and the potential for a better world at the forefront of my attitude. In my own struggles, in our search for our next pastor, in our response to the crisis in our MC USA, and also in finding renewed joy and fruitfulness to our church life here at Eden. I ask for your continued and fervent prayers for me to that end, to all who give leadership in this church and to each person who is a part of our Body. May we heed the Psalmist's words to "Be still and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations." Ps 46:10

Eden Leadership Team

The Eden Leadership Team met Thursday, August 20, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. at the Church Office.

Bret called the meeting to order. Linda lit the candle to remind us of God's presence.

Brenda led in devotions. She talked about new beginnings. Read from Revelations 21: 4 & 5. She led in prayer.

Corrections to minutes. The amount Bret reported last month for Mary Schrag should have been \$1,000.00 instead of \$500.00. In the Worship Commission report the word conservation should have read conversation. The minutes were approved as corrected.

Treasurer Report - The revenue is \$244,896.65 and the expenses are \$258,311.42 with a deficit of (\$13,414.77). The CHB S.S. class has a \$96.66 deficit in their account. They will be serving the second meal in September.

For the Wednesday night meals the Christian Education/ Discipleship Commission would like the meals to feel more welcome to all people. The donation cans will not be put on the tables but there will be a basket or can available at the window for a free will offering. If expenses are not met, then will Christian Ed. pick up the remaining costs? They would like that to be a gift to the church. Pastor Derek will find out about that.

Gib Burgan representing the Sound/Video committee brought a proposal. They would like to add a projector to the back of the sanctuary so that Pastors and Choirs can see what is on the screen that the congregation sees up front. The screen is 50" x 80". The cost is:

Projector - \$1,500.00.

Two additional pieces of equipment - \$380.00 and \$384.00 Cable - \$375.00

Programming and design - \$550.00 Installation - \$1,945.00

Screen - \$1,555.00

It will be mounted on the left side facing back. This would help with transition for the choir so they don't have to move to see the screen. We could eliminate the cost of the screen by painting a square on the wall. The Worship Commission doesn't have sufficient funds to pay for this project. The funds could come out of the Capital Building Fund. The Trustees are aware of this project and affirm this. Who approves it? Congregation or ELT? The congregation should be informed about the sound system remodeling and also the projector project. Gib and the Worship Commission will make an announcement about this. There are some old sound boards they would like to dispose of. They may ask WDC if they would be in need of them for a new church starting up or Camp Mennoscah.

The ELT approved unanimously that they can order the projector. When they inform the congregation about this project, they will ask for donations to cover this. The remaining cost after donations will come out of Capital Building Fund.

Worship Commission - Excited about exploring the top scriptures. There were approximately 300- 350 submitted.

Peace/Witness Commission - Bob and Sondra Tolle have received \$3,000.00 a year. Mary Schrag is in Pennsylvania with PULSE. She was given \$1,000.00. She went on her own to do some fundraising. ELT would like to see her get up front with a Peace/Witness member and announce that she already was given \$1,000.00 from Peace/Witness. If she hasn't raised the money then Peace/Witness will pay for it. They also gave \$1,500.00 to Dana, a friend of Alyssa Schrag from Serbia who will be serving in Washington D.C. The money was given through Alyssa and she will wire it to Dana. Eden will also be her sponsoring church. We need to make more than a financial commitment to Dana.

Stewardship Commission - They will be meeting Sunday. They are going to start working on the budget. We are short of money. Could we make payments to missions and not transfer to the Commissions? If commissions have an excess budget and don't use it all, could the excess be used for the operating expenses and missions? The Stewardship Commission will inform the congregation at the annual meeting about what they have decided about the expenditures. They have the authority to tell Jay how to spend the money.

Deacon - They have been having discussion about small groups. They will be communicating about the records update. That would be a policy change. If the Deacons don't hear from the people a second time, then they will be moved to the associate list. If there is feedback, Deacons can do the legwork and come back with recommendation. *ELT will give final approval to policy changes*.

Trustees - There are two windows in room 127 and a skylight that are broken and need to be replaced. The MCC wagon will be stored in the Janitor's room and that room will need a keypad lock on it. The sidewalk at the west entrance has a bad hole and needs to be fixed. A leak in the church office roof also needs to be patched.

Pastor Lee - He will be leading a guys Bible Study. The services are scheduled through fall (advent). Communion will be held on October 4.

Pastor Derek - They will be having a meeting to plan for FEWZ. Robin and Kyle Schrag, Becky King, Tyler Stucky and Shenese Allen are the new sponsors. West Zion and First Christian want to compensate Derek for his leadership with the youth. If they don't compensate him, he will still go ahead with the responsibility.

The Peace/Witness Commission has not discussed the Benevolent Needs Proposal but they will discuss it Sunday. Discussion took place about the openness from the ELT to the congregation. The full ELT minutes will be published in the Echoes.

KIPCOR - only 2 people have signed up to participate. Kyle will do a verbal announcement on the 23rd and Bret will announce on the 30th. Marcy will do snacks and Derek will call the cheerleading coach about child care.

We are still working on replacements for SCRT and Worship Commission.

The Stewardship Commission will bring budget to ELT on November 19 for approval so that it can be presented to the congregation.

December congregation meeting - The budget and ballot will be presented and also ask the congregation to affirm our structure that we implemented 2 years ago.

The next meeting is Thursday, September 17 at the church office. Pastor Derek will have opening devotions.

Further details of commission reports will always be posted on bulletin boards each month and they can be printed off at the church office if you would like a personal copy.

Meeting adjourned at 8:59 p.m.

Former Eden Interim Pastor passes away

Eleanor Beachy, (81) was born in Menahga, Minnesota, October 6 1933. She was the youngest of 11 siblings.

Eleanor married Perry Beachy on June 2, 1956. They had one son, Jonathan.

She served as interim pastor at Eden Mennonite Church from 1995-1996. She and her husband also served as interim teachers at Hesston College.

Eleanor was an enthusiastic writer. Her articles, stories, poems, and plays were published in *Christian Living, The Instructor, The Mennonite, Purpose, Story Friends,* and other magazines. A few months before her death, she self-published a book of her poetry, *Seasons of Spirit, Relationships, and Nature.*

Eleanor died on August 12, 2015 at Wesley Hospital. She was 81-years-old.



- Courage to face fiery furnaces or shipwrecks




Enjoy this healthy apple snack after a busy day of learning.
