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Connecting the dots

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One of my favorite games as a kid while sitting in the church worship service was something we called "squares." It was a game with lots of dots on a page that two of us would take turns drawing one line each that connected two dots. A person gained points by eventually drawing a line that formed a complete square. We had fun simply connecting dots.

Sometimes it feels like pastoral ministry is like that, too. Once when I was serving communion and folks were coming forward to receive the elements, a nine year-old girl sitting in the front row whispered "Derek, can I come up, too?" I gave her a little shake of the head, but made sure to find her immediately after the service and tell her how excited I was that she wanted to participate, but that I wanted to make sure she understood what we were doing and why. So as I prepared to give some explanation the next week I said to myself, "How do I explain communion without explaining baptism?" then "How do I explain baptism without explaining Jesus?" then "How do I explain Jesus without explaining God's salvation plan revealed through the Old Testament?" I was again trying to connect the dots.

It can also feel like life is a practice of continually connecting dots. We regularly ask ourselves what one aspect of life has to do with another. At one point Christianity was the official religion of the Roman Empire. All other parts of one's life fell under the identity of Roman Christian. Since the Reformation, that one identity became two: a "political" and a "religious" identity. Now our nationality, gender, occupation, religion, etc. are all separate identities that we indicate in boxes on forms. Unfortunately many in our society are happy to keep those things separate, as if they need not affect each other too much. "Going to church" is just one thing in a long list of other things we do on a weekly basis. They are separate dots that we can connect if we feel like it.

The Christian life, however, is not simply one dot among many on a page. It is the whole sheet of paper! This is why the law of Moses included rules about worship, business practices, family relations, and diet. Similarly the book of Colossians reminds us that to proclaim Christ as Lord means allowing Him to rule over every part of our lives; 1:16 all things have been created through him and for him...18 He is the head of the body, the church...so that he might come to have first place in everything.

This is why we choose to spend our Sunday mornings worshipping our Lord with fellow believers. This is why we extend love and hospitality to strangers. This is why we take care of the resources God has given us and give generously. This is why we use our hands and feet to help those in need. This is why we use our voices to proclaim peace, to speak up for the voiceless, and to refuse to participate in violence of any kind.

May our faith in Jesus not be just one more dot in our lives, but may each dot be connected by and to Jesus, in whom *all things hold together* (Colossians 1:17).

The Eden Leadership Team met Thursday, September 17, at 7:00 p.m. at the church.

Pastor Derek opened with devotions. He read from Luke 4. The scroll of Isaiah was opened. He read from and evangelical preacher's response to a speech made by Bernie Sanders at Liberty University. "If you have done it for the least of these, you have done it for me." ELT has focus on Eden, we need to have an eye for the poor and the imprisoned. We need to think about how we spend our energy on our own concerns. He led in pray-

Bret called the meeting to order.

The minutes were corrected. The Stewardship Commission did not meet on Sunday as stated in the minutes. They were approved as corrected.

Budget as of September 15:

Revenue - \$268,920.65

Expenses - \$309,294.99

Difference - (\$40,374.34)

The budget is \$314,414.00

Four of the six payments have been made. There are two left. Last year we only made 5 out of 6. We ended up \$10,000.00 to the good last year. We would like to make all 6 payments. Could we make payments to missions instead of Commissions? We normally show a deficit at this time of year and then by the end of the year the deficit seems to disappear. Does excess amount in Commissions balance discourage people from giving? We need to look at how we handle excess funds. Is there a reserve fund to cover the deficit? Money Market and Checking account are accessible immediately. There is still \$52,000.00 left to make mission payments. \$6,000.00 of that is internal transfers to commissions.

Discussion for next meeting:

What minimum reserves should be?

What will be spent next year by commissions?

What to budget for next year?

What to do with Commissions excess funds in accounts?

Stewardship - The Deacons were the only ones to meet the deadline for submitting their needs for the budget line. The final date for them to get their requests to the Stewardship Commission is OCTOBER 15. It would be good to have them by next ELT meeting.

Schedule for budget proposal time line.

Stewardship Commission will meet November 17 to finalize budget.

ELT will approve budget November 19

The budget proposal will be given out to the congregation on November 29

December 6, the budget, ballot and approval to fully implement the 2 year trial structure will be voted on.

ELT agreed to this schedule. The Stewardship Commission will be on the agenda for next meeting, Oct. 15.

Worship - Jerry attended in place of Linda. They would like to

have a variety show or some kind of a get together this fall. They will give the idea to the congregation to see if someone will take it and roll with it.

Peace/Witness - They were going to fund Dana from Serbia. They sent \$1,500.00 to Alyssa Schrag who was going to wire the funds to Dana. Then Dana decided not to come. So that money was available. Mark contacted PULSE. Mary Schrag was \$920.00 short of meeting her commitment. So they funded Mary's obligation in full. They still have \$1,673.00 in VS fund and also excess in general fund as well. The Peace/Witness Commission and Deacons will meet this Sunday, Sept 20, during the S.S. hour to discuss the Benevolent fund. Bo will present it to them. Kyle will represent ELT at that meeting.

The Peace/Witness Commission is looking at some possibilities for Peace Sunday. They are looking at having a Congregation action Sunday in regards to Syria. Still working on details. Michelle Armster, MCC Central States Executive would be good for a speaker.

Education/Discipleship Commission- will meet On Monday, September 21st.

Deacons - Waiting on feedback from membership proposals by October 1. Still discussing small groups.

Trustees - The janitors room has a number pad on it. The MCC wagon will be stored there. The trees will be treated for bag worms in June next year to get the most effective kill. Brandon Kaufman won the drawing to farm the church ground. They wrote up a 7 year contract with him and the Trustees and Brandon signed it. The ELT approved the contract unanimously. Eden Church usage agreement was discussed. The associate and full members will not be charged for using the church. Usage policies should read, Final approval of each Church usage agreement remains at the discretion of the Trustees. If another Pastor is involved, the Pastors should go the Deacons for permission. Phone numbers for janitors should also be added to the form. ELT approved the corrected document.

Pine Village Basket - Jerri Kaufman will prepare the basket and ELT will cover the cost.

WDC is Oct 30 and 31. With our membership roll of 634 we could have 22 votes. The registration cost will be offered to be paid by Deacons. The Pastors will meet and decide if the Resolution Committee should reconvene and share more with the congregation concerning the Rainbow resolution. We are figuring 410 active members and that would give us 14 votes. Let the congregation know that we are deciding that on active members.

Al Neufeld will fill the two year term left by Bob Tolle's resignation on the SCRT. Still need someone for the three year term. Tyler Stucky will fill the 2 year term on the Worship Commission left by Sondra's resignation.

Tent update - The SEEDS class cleaned the tent and all parts are there. It is 40 X 40. They would like to teach others to set it up also.

Projector update - The Inman Technical Director at the school will be coming out next Wednesday to possibly give a more cost effective price to the project.

KIPCOR is postponed for now. They need a higher percentage of people to make it worthwhile.

No new business.

Pastor Lee will have devotions at the next meeting.

- One Circle Leader, on disability, is now working part-time, and now at 185% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.
- One Circle Leader has now been at his job for over a year, and having been through the OMEGA Program, is now living on his own.

Since our beginning in 2010, 18 Circle Leaders (with a total of 26 children) have left poverty. With this, they have had an average earned income gain of 217% and an estimated ROI of \$1,046,520.


Make these practical gifts to share blessings with homeless people and others in need.
