11-30-15 Advent I Summary Preparing For His Coming Pastor Lee Suderman

How one approaches the Christmas season really depends on how we understand the birth of Christ as the true "reason for the season." For followers of Christ this approaching celebration of joyful music, emerging lights and giving of gifts speaks of new hope for a world broken by sin. The gift of salvation announced by the angels' message of joy and peace to all who would seek God's favor upon their lives.

Luke's gospel account, chap. 1, introduces Zechariah the priest and his wife, Elizabeth, who represented a faithful remnant of Jews who continued to wait for the promised Messiah. As the aged priest fulfilled his yearly duties in the Temple, the angel, Gabriel, appeared to announce that Zechariah and Elizabeth would now have a son who would prepare the way for the long awaited Savior of the world. As Zechariah asked for a sign to confirm this unlikely event, he was struck dumb until this child would be born.

God had not spoken directly to Israel for 400 years since the last words of Malachi in the Old Testament. They, like we today, may well have forgotten or given up hope for change for their troubled world. They, like we, were doubtful of their part in these new developments and fearful of what this new beginning might represent for them. And as a result, they, like we, were challenged to wait in silence and ponder what this new message could mean to them, and to us when this season of dormancy was finally over.

Yet in a day when skepticism and pessimism is fashionable, there are still many reasons for hope in our lives today. Hope still springs eternal when a cycle of unbelief, dysfunction or despair are finally broken by answered prayer or the sheer undeserved mercy of God. Or when time has given us a better perspective of unexpected events in our lives. The key is to keep "hoping against hope" in the confidence of an almighty God as Abraham did, and to stay close to the One who is "the reason for our hope," I Pet. 3:15.

As the seed dies to send forth roots, stem and a leaf even through the dormancy of winter; and as these are awakened by the warming sun and nourishing rains of spring and stimulating winds of summer, it is then that the ear and ripened grain will produce more fruit; 20, 50, or 100-fold "in its season." So let us remain expectant and ready for the unexpected work of God in our midst. Waiting, reflecting and preparing for what God has in store for us as, we again celebrate the "Word becoming flesh among us."
