A "Mary Life" in a "Martha World"

Pastor Derek's Lenten article of last month moved the dial of my thinking
even a bit further in the direction of taking time for self and family, and es-
pecially how to simplify (or de-clutter?) my/our lives. This topic of simpli-
fying life attracted more interest than I would have expected as we recently
discussed future preaching topics with our Deacon Commission. Where, for
example, do we set our boundaries when there is so much need and pain all

around us; and some of us almost seem to "care too much" sometimes? Even to the detriment of our personal health, family, ministry or other relationships.

I know I need to simplify and slow down but don't even get around to reading an excellent book that I have on this subject. Part of it is priorities to address the many interests and needs around me, as is probably true for a lot of us today. I also know that service and ministry can be demanding and messy as Jesus reminds us. But if the salt has lost its effectiveness, it has little impact on what needs to be salted. Even Jesus recognized his limits as he withdrew from his work regularly to be refreshed. At one of his favorite retreats he even chided Martha for being too preoccupied with serving, and commended Mary for just sitting and listening to him.

How do we create for ourselves more of a "Mary Life" in a "Martha World?" My car has a tachometer that warns me if the engine is running too fast with a "red zone" if it goes above 6,500 RPM. Frankly, most of the time it doesn't go much beyond 3,500 or 4,000 RPM. To be in the red zone too much would mean my fuel efficiency would go down, and wear on the engine and tires would go up. My speed would make driving more demanding and hazardous, and increase the possibility of a crash, and the police would soon be in hot pursuit. So what are the lessons I might learn from this example? Who are the people who will come warn me when I'm "red-lining" too much with my life, my body, my family or schedule?

An urban California pastor once preached a message entitled, "Where There's Milk, There's Manure." I wondered what he might practically know about the topic, when I discovered that his text probably came from Proverbs 14:4, "Where no oxen are the manger is clean, but much increase comes by the strength of the ox." Or "An empty stable stays clean, but no income comes from an empty stable (NLT)." Whichever image we choose, any successful enterprise involving livestock (or people) will result in the need to clean the stall regularly for best results. This is also true whether it involves the messiness of church ministry or the tendency for our lives to get messy and need thorough, periodic cleaning as well.

Where do I begin this task of prioritizing my efforts for best results? In Romans 12:3 Paul says we should not overestimate ourselves or what God has gifted us to do. Proverbs 14:6 suggests that only a wise person truly knows what his or her own limits really are. Proverbs 25:28 says that a person without self-control is as defenseless as a city with broken down walls. All of which seem to suggest that prayerfully setting good boundaries and respectfully sticking with them will take me a long way as I try to put my emphasis on "being" rather than "doing." To be willing to step away from responsibilities that are not necessarily mine, rather than fearing being considered lazy or being criticized for firmly, graciously saying "no."

Someone has said that "the savior complex brings many disappointments." Just being a faithful, understanding friend will be more realistic for most of us anyway. I admit that I respect people who are able to invest their time, gifts, resources and relationships wisely according to God's will as good stewards. I do hope to get to those books on simplifying, and perhaps even a message on this if requested. Meanwhile, I'll be seeking to practice what I'm preaching here and invite you to join me.

Eden Leadership Team



The Eden Leadership Team met Tuesday, March 15, 2016 at the Church.

Present were: Carol Zerger, Bill Zerger, Jerry Schrag, JoLene Kaufman, Katie Gillmore, Bret Gillmore, Morgan Kaufman, Perry Krehbiel, Jay Goering, Jean Regier, Pastor Derek, Pastor Lee, and Kyle Neufeld.

Absent were: Brenda and Marcy

Bret opened with prayer and lit the candle to show the Holy Spirit's presence. The minutes were approved as print-

ed.

Treasurer Report: The amount shown in the difference from revenue to expenses is \$47,256.84. That includes the \$26,000.00 from the money that was cleared out of balances last year. The actual difference is \$21,256.84.

When the Worship Commission gets money for Men's Chorus, can that money be subtracted from the expenditures? The money is available if the commission needs it. The Trustees asked what fund would be used for the valve and foundation repair that is going to be completed? This would come out of the maintenance fund.

Peace/Witness Commission: They had a successful bucket challenge. Over 50 buckets were taken to MCC and \$1,500.00 was also given. Eighty t-shirts were ordered. If they need to order again they have to order 25 at a time.

Trustee Report: A leaking valve needs to be replaced. The foundation repair will be done on May 16. The following will take place on March 18 and 19 during the Church work days:

- 1. All bulbs will be replaced in the sanctuary light fixtures with new LED bulbs.
- 2. Interior painting of the N and SW parts of the church.
- 3. Weather permitting, dirt will be placed around the graves in the cemetery.

All exterior control joints will be re-caulked in the near future. Caulking will also be done around the monument at Hopefield. **Deacon Commission:** They completed the organization of the mailboxes. There will be communion and foot washing at the Good Friday services. April 10 there will be communion at Eden and people will have to come forward to receive communion. They added two new people to the Visitation team. They are Tim Regehr and Bonita Howard.

Stewardship Commission: Nothing to report.

Worship Commission: Planning for Good Friday services. There will be a meal of soup and bread. There will also be a garden room for praying and a room with essential oils and their meaning. Jill Zerger will be coordinating the oils. April 24 the Bethel College Women's Ensemble will give a program. Peter Goerzen, Campus Pastor, will also be here. Christian Education/Discipleship Commission: They are planning for Children's Day on June 5, 2016. There will be a time for games for all ages, which Katie Gillmore will be in charge of. The children will present the music they learned on Wednesday nights. There will be burgers and hot dogs and also potluck. They are working on a proposal for a safe sanctuary. They will bring it to the ELT in the next few months. **Pastor Lee:** Just getting back from sister-in-law's funeral. Another eye surgery is planned in April. He has a conflict for the Tuesday night Holy Week Service. He will not participate.

Pastor Derek:

Holy Week services are coming together nicely. Pastor Laura is in charge of the Prayer Walk. Pastor Brad is planning the Tuesday night service at Pine Village along with Pastors Derek and Laura. The sunrise service is a joint service with West Zion and First Mennonite. It will be held at Russ Stucky's pasture, 1 mile east of Christian on Buckskin Rd. There will not be a breakfast. Pastor Derek's family vacation to the East Coast is planned for May 10 - 21.

Leadership Training: Katie Gillmore reported on the training she attended. Kyle Neufeld, Pastor Derek and Becky King also attended. She had us evaluate the Vision Statement on a scale of indifference to totally committed. We wrote our preference down and crumpled the paper and tossed it around. Then we read the letter chosen. The most chosen one was the one that means a full commitment. For going forward, we have to get out of our comfort zone and stretch our boundaries and engage others. There is a book available, *Your Leadership Ed Book*, that would be helpful for those who attended. Jay moved and Morgan seconded that we purchase 4 books. The money will come out of the Leadership Development Fund. Motion carried. Vision/ Mission Statements - Mission: To be a community that follows Jesus in all we do and say.

Vision: A people transformed by the Holy Spirit in worship and service, so that through us God's grace, love and peace are made known to the world.

This is a significant departure from the first draft. They heard lots of questions and made changes that people were very passionate about. What is the next step for ELT? It would be helpful to explain the process of change to the congregation. There is an available Sunday in Spring for a sermon on this statement. A suggestion was made to put the words 'a people transformed by the Holy Spirit in worship and service' into the Mission Statement to read 'To be a community, transformed by the Holy Spirit in worship and service, in all we do and say.' Pastor Derek will write a Thank You to the congregation for their contributions to the statements. This statement will be processed by the ELT and they will revisit it at their next meeting in April.

SHAVING CREAM EARTH


God created this wonderful world and told us to care for it. Remember that by making a unique painting.
