"Holy Comparison"



I am the type of person that lives with the constant desire to compare myself to others. As I look around, I compare my body, my vehicle, even my children. This compulsion borders on being unhealthy, as it hinders my ability to simply be grateful to God

for all that has been given to me. I hope and pray that I will be given eyes that more fully see me with God's vision. However, I imagine this struggle within me will be ongoing, even if I am gifted with a measure of heavenly perspective. So perhaps I can use the comparison eyes to better myself for God's purposes, to be more faithful, loving, and gracious.

I thought about this comparison tendency recently as I read a part of Paul's second letter to the Corinthian church in which he challenges the church to be more giving. Paul gives a report about the churches in Macedonia, how through their sorrows, joys, and poverty they have "overflowed in a wealth of generosity." Paul affirms all that the Corinthian church has been doing and adds "we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking." Paul goes on to write, "I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others." Sounds a little manipulative, right? Paul seems to be playing on this comparison thing to get people motivated. But while it seems like a poor reason for the Corinthian church to be upping their game, it may be helpful and healthy.

In Paul's letter to the Romans, he again brings up this idea of competition when he writes "outdo one another in showing honor." I wonder if Paul is fully aware that comparison and competition are part of human nature and so he wants to utilize that impulse for God's glory. If left unchecked, comparison can lead towards self-loathing because we just can never measure up to others' successes and accomplishments. Or it can lead to other-destruction as we strive to improve ourselves so as to leave our "competitors" in the dust. Either way, comparison is extremely selfcentered and can be quite destructive, as we have seen from countless stories including Cain and Abel, Esau and Jacob, and Saul and David. This is why I believe Paul is redirecting our desires, knowing that competition can serve God's kingdom. If you compare yourself to others, don't do it for a better body, more successes, and more things; do it for the good of others. If you compete, Paul says, compete to be more of a servant. The result, hopefully is not more praise for you, but that, as Jesus says, "they will see your good works and give glory to your father in heaven."

It is with this perspective in mind that I began reading the book of Acts with Pastor Dianne weekly. We wanted to read about the beginnings of the church and see if their were healthy ways to compare it to our own church. What are some of the characteristics and activities of the early church and how can these motivate our church to glorify God and follow Jesus in all we say and do? We've noticed a few helpful things: 1. The early church relied very heavily on the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) to make sense of all they had witnessed. 2. The apostle's were so motivated to speak of Jesus that they couldn't fathom quitting, even under threat of persecution. 3. The people who joined the group committed their whole lives to the church. I invite you to join us in reading through the earliest accounts of the church of Christ as it formed and grew in the book of Acts. How does the early church speak to us today? These comparisons can be helpful, if the emphasis remains on being faithful and glorifying God.

Similarly, in your own life, I invite you to pay attention to your comparisons and competition. Do not allow them to take over your self-worth. Do not let them to lead you to putting down others. Instead, focus your comparisons on people of faith, on the Scriptures, and on Jesus, so that you may be motivated to improve your love and service to God, neighbors, and enemies alike.

Treasurer Report

Commission Reports

Deacon Commission

Peace/Witness Commission

Peace Commission is focusing on Peace Sunday, and they have set the date for April 23. A gentleman from San Antonio will be speaking during worship and S.S. hour. There will be a potluck and an opportunity for Peace Essays to be shared after the meal. There could be an opportunity to send letters concerning immigration.

Trustee Commission:

The work on the church office is progressing. The back half has been gutted and rooms framed. They are waiting on windows and doors that are back ordered. After they are in, they will drywall, mud and paint. One day they had volunteers that were 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, and 80 years of age. Volunteers need to

call Larry Kaufman to coordinate working schedules at the office.

There will be a church workday on Saturday, March 25. There is work that needs to be done in the cemetery, and there may be work available at the church office that day too.

Stewardship Commission

They will meet in March and had nothing to report at this time.

Education/Discipleship Commission

The commission is working on the policy for abuse prevention. There were several people that didn't come for one of the two training meetings that were held.

Worship Commission

Ash Wednesday will be observed with a short service on Wednesday March 1. They will put together a committee for the Eden Retreat Weekend at Camp Mennoscah. They have talked about joining West Zion for the retreat. Some new microphone stands have been purchased.

Pastor Dianne

She has met most of the Pine Village residents. Her main priorities are worship and visitation. She has been working on the worship services for Lent.

Pastor Derek

He attended the AVDS weekend at Hesston College that focused on trauma, abuse and non-violence.

Holy Week Services will be at West Zion on Sunday and Monday. The subject will be how the cross speaks to trauma.

There seemed to be a lot of energy for the fact that we dedicated 5 babies on one Sunday.

Office Remodel

The trustees needed to move very quickly to get a person in place to manage the construction and the volunteers. Larry Kaufman was hired to fill this role. He had been overseeing it on a volunteer basis, but now will be paid \$22.00 an hour and will only be there when he is needed. Bill Zerger is the overall contractor.

Constitution Review

No progress.

Conference Delegates

ELT is responsible for finding delegates. For MC USA we will need 4 and for WDC we will need 12. ELT should promote the conference. Kyle will start recruiting delegates. March 28 is the end of early registration for MC USA.

Leadership Retreat Review

The Pastors were thanked for organizing the retreat. It was a very good day. Appreciation was expressed for how the activities made it easy to see how the Commissions overlapped and affected other Commissions.

The Trustee Commission has revised the church usage agreement. The biggest change is that there are no charges for the use of the building. People who want to use the building need to fill out a form with contact information, and the date and time they want to use it. If use of the sound/video system or kitchen is needed, those church members will fill those roles on a voluntary basis according to the availability of those persons. The policy will include a liability clause, as well as a no smoking or alcohol allowed on the premises clause. It will also include a statement saying if they would like to contribute for use of the building there will be someone to talk to about that. Gary Regier will bring the policy to ELT next month and it will be reviewed at that time.

Hello Church Family!

Here is an update about my experience here in Rwanda thus far.

Growing up in the Midwest one of the big adjustments I have made in Rwanda is getting used to the terrain here in the land of a

thousand hills. I did not arrive in hill shape. Fortunately, I am finally growing used to walking up steep hills, and I have learned it's worth the effort to see the beautiful views that the heights have to offer.

I have experienced many other challenges of crosscultural immersion including the discomfort of being the other, the language barrier, and adjusting to new food. However, I have also experienced many joys. I have settled into life with my host family and feel so blessed to be able to live with such a generous family while I am in Kigali. I am also blessed to have a fellow SALTer, Annika Bolter, here with me to share in my experiences. In the mornings Annika and I have Kinyarwanda class. I am making slow progress with the language, but I am also learning so much about the culture of Rwanda and we are making a good friend in our teacher, Jean-Baptiste. In the afternoons we travel to our work assignments.

I am thrilled to be working with MCC's partner organization, Transformational Leadership Center or TLC, at the Kigali Children's Peace Library in Kicurkiro. I am passionate about libraries, and it brings me joy to be around children who love to read as much as I do. I am happy to encourage them in building a culture of reading and help them improve their English literacy skills. In the weeks to come, the library is looking into adopting some new library practices that will allow them to improve record keeping, book classification, and patron relations. They are also excited to begin peer mediation trainings in February. I am looking forward to assisting as I can.

I have much to be thankful for here in my new home, and while some parts of my first cross-cultural experience are still a struggle, kind of like trudging up one of Rwanda's steep hills, with each step of the journey the view gets better, and I am excited to see what the rest of my year has to offer.
