## Walking

Over the Memorial Day week-end we did a lot of walking while visiting our son, Ryan, who lives in Middleton, Wisconsin. We walked to see the quaint downtown shops and restaurants near his apartment. We walked in downtown Madison to visit all the Farmer's Market booths which encircled the entire state capitol building and square. We walked through some

beautifully blooming botanical gardens plus a small portion of an arboretum. We walked and played 18-holes of golf (ok, it was just mini-golf). According to my step counter, we walked more than 10,000 steps each day.

Walking makes me slow down. Walking provides the opportunity to pay attention or notice things that I normally would miss as I rush from one thing to another: the smell of fresh baked muffins, the scent of lilacs, the chattering of birds, or the squeals of children at play. Sometimes I walk to get exercise whether on the track at the YMCA or in my neighborhood in the coolness of the morning. For several years I went with friends several times a week to walk and talk about our lives. Last school year I experimented with praying while I walked as a spiritual practice. Jesus walked a lot. The gospels are filled with accounts of him walking into the countryside, walking by the Sea of Galilee, walking in the Temple, and even walking on water. It seems like Jesus could have covered more territory if someone would have loaned him a horse. Instead, he walked everywhere he went, except for the short stint on a donkey near the end. Walking gave him time to see things, like a beggar sitting by the side of the road, or a short man sitting in a tree. Because he was moving slowly, he could engage in deep conversations with his disciples and other followers. Sometimes he had a destination and sometimes he did not. Jesus was a walker.

As followers of Jesus we are exhorted to walk in the footsteps of Jesus. We can't literally do that but we can model our lives and live in such a way that reflect the kingdom values that Jesus lived and taught. Throughout the Bible, walking is used as a metaphor for spiritual living. In the Old Testament walking in God's ways meant obedience to the commandments. The prophet Micah tells us to "walk humbly with our God." The letters to the early church are filled with a variety of references to walking: walking in love, walking by faith, walking in the Spirit, walking in truth, walking in darkness or light. These are not referencing the physical act of putting one foot in front of another, but to how we live our life of faith.

It's interesting that this metaphor of walking is drawn from everyday life. I take a walk outside to enjoy nature. I walk to the library. I walk for fitness or to go to the post office. Walking is something ordinary that I can do at any time. It doesn't take any special skills like running a marathon. Yet it can be countercultural since most of the time I drive to wherever I want to go. It's quicker to drive and I can be more efficient and I have things to carry. There is always an excuse for why I need to drive instead of walking. To walk means I'm choosing another way. I'm choosing to slow down.

I invite us all to take time to walk this summer, even if it's just out to the backyard. Walk and pay attention to the sights and sounds around you. Walk and enjoy God's creation. Walk and pray. Walk with a companion. Walk and listen. Walk and notice who needs to be cared for and loved. Walk barefoot and feel the earth under your feet, recognizing that you are on holy ground. Walk humbly with your God.

I have a book on my shelf that is entitled, *The Way is Made by Walking*, by Arthur Paul Boers. It is the author's reflections on his pilgrimage along the Camino de Santiago in Spain, and his spiritual learnings on his walk. Someday I hope to read this book, but this summer we can all hear reflections from our own pilgrims (Jay & Linda Goering and Jeff & Becky Koller) who made a similar walk on the Camino last September. They will be sharing their story with us when we gather for worship at Camp Mennoscah on July 14. I look forward to learning from their walking experience.

As you walk this summer, take with you this verse from Jeremiah 6:16 – Stand at the crossroads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls.

The Eden Leadership Team met May 13, 2019 at the Eden Church Office

**Members present:** Pastor Derek, Pastor Dianne, Barbara Stucky, Ken Stucky, Keith Albrecht, Berni Kaufman, Marcia

We read the Eden Mennonite Church Mission and Vision statements in unison.

**Lectio Divina devotions were read** from Genesis 1: 26 -31. Jay led in prayer. He lit a candle to symbolize the presence of the Holy Spirit.

The April 8, 2019 ELT Minutes were approved as submitted. Pastor Dianne had a concern about the discussion on Board Member replacement and how this policy will be communicated.

**Budget report—Austin Goering.** Current income: \$121,000 and Current expenses: \$175,000. Last year at this time income was \$16,000 higher. We are -\$54,000 behind, and last year at this time we were -\$22,000 behind.

# Reports

**Peace Commission—Mark Stucky:** Two young women from Eden will be entering into voluntary service and the Peace Commission will plan to support them from their budget. The message of our Peace Sunday speaker, Ben Kreider, was well received.

**Deacon Commission—Barb Stucky:** The deacons replaced the brochures in the restrooms, discussed visitation schedules in preparation for Pastor Derek's sabbatical. They worked on the on-call schedule. They will be picking up coverage on Thursdays. On May 26, 2019, there will be a commissioning service for Jenny Schrag and a send off blessing for Pastor Derek and his family. The deacons served communion on May 13. The deacons are working on an abuse response policy and are studying First Mennonite of Newton's policy as an example. The deacons will plan to submit the policy to the ELT for consideration.

**Stewardship Commission—Ken Stucky:** They have met and are strategizing on methods to increase giving to the church to alleviate the budget deficit. They have not reached consensus on a course of action. They meet again 5/21/19.

**Trustee Commission—Keith Albrecht:** Two men began work on refinishing the stage floor 5/13/19. Gary Regier, Matt Schrag, and Keith moved everything but the piano off the stage ahead of time. They will work around the piano and will be finished with the job by 5/15/19, so everything can be moved back on the stage Saturday, 5/18/19. The SCRT and trustees are planning to meet together to clarify concerns and questions regarding custodial staff supervision.

**Worship Commission—Berni Kaufman:** They are discussing *Voices Together*, a new Mennonite hymnal coming out in 2020.

Education Commission—Marcia Goering: The theme for the Sunday school picnic this year is "All God's Critters" and will be held 6/2/19 at the church. The committee will serve hamburgers and hotdogs and church members will bring side dishes and desserts. There will be games following the meal for all ages.

**Pastor Derek:** He is finalizing convention plans for the youth. Four high school boys and sponsor, Shenise Allen, will be attending from the FEWZ youth group. We will be recognizing one high school graduate on 5/19/19. He wrote a synopsis of his sabbatical plans in the April Eden Echoes. He is working on ''letting go'' as he prepares for his sabbatical leave.

**Pastor Dianne:** She has completed the summer worship schedule. It will be refreshing to have a variety of speakers and different voices heard. She will be spending Memorial Day weekend visiting her son and family. Next week will be the every other month meal with Pine Village Eden members. She is looking forward to working with Jenny Schrag.

Picture Bulletin Board—Jay Goering: The deacons have brought up that the picture bulletin board of church family photos is in need of an update. There was discussion about how to go about updating this. Attendees and members could be asked to provide an updated picture for the board. It would be nice to have uniform labeling of all of the photos. We are uncertain who would be willing to spearhead this project. Jay will make some inquiries. There was also discussion about the possibility of having a digital file of pictures that could be made available linked to the Eden Church website.

Marvin Zehr from the WDC will tabulate results and give a summary report. A cover letter will give detailed instructions and will have a place for demographic information and signature. The cover letter will be detached and kept separately from the questionnaire.



In 2009 the Eden congregation adopted an Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund provides ongoing financial support for our church's mission. This fund enables Eden to expand its local, regional, national and international mission and service ministries beyond those supported by our annual budget.

This fund is supported solely by charitable bequests and gifts made to Eden and designated to the Eden Endowment Fund. These funds are acquired by memorial money designated to Eden, cash donations, stocks, bonds, real estate, and other securities.

Grants are awarded on an annual basis. Each year the Endowment Committee gives a financial report on the fund, makes the congregation aware of the monies available for disbursement and encourages congregants and others to apply for a grant. All grants awarded are made public in May.






