## Caring for God’s Good Creation

*The earth is the Lord’s and everything in it,  
the world, and all who live in it. Psalm 24:1*

Last fall my seminary class was a study on the theology, ethics and spirituality of creation care. The semester was full of reading various authors on this topic as well as taking intentional time to engage “my place.” To learn about my place, I spent time walking in nature, I took a guided bird walk, I started a compost bin, and I interviewed several people in this congregation about their land. I discovered that many people have a deep connection to their land not only through family legacy but their land is a sanctuary where they encounter God. I heard deep desires to live in harmony with their land and care for it well.

The question arose in the course of my study, “Do Christians have special responsibilities for the care of creation?” In some ways this question seems self-evident that Christians, those of us who have a deep connection with the Creator, will of course care deeply for all that the Creator has made. The underlying question however is what special motivations or mandates have we been given that are unique from others who do not profess belief or faith in God as creator, redeemer or sustainer? I believe that our special responsibilities flow from our covenantal relationship with God in whom we “live and move and have our being.” (Acts 17:28) Our relationship and connection to God means that we will align ourselves with God’s intentions for all of creation.

As humans we are created in the image of God, and thus are to live into God’s intention, which seeks and delights in the flourishing of all creation. Living in the image of God means a responsibility and call to follow a model of servanthood. In servanthood our orientation is shifted from self-interest to looking for the well-being and care of others. Rather than dominating and controlling, there is a call for the interdependency and mutuality of all creation. In reflecting God’s image, we look for the ways God offers grace, hospitality, and care so that we also can emulate such care for the earth. Living in God’s image means living in gratitude for the gift of creation and God’s sustaining presence in it. In this vein we become students of creation and learn to serve creation, becoming attuned to all the complexities it presents.

As God’s people we find our connection to the creator through the gift of land. The land that God gave to God’s people Israel brought a deep, covenantal relationship between God as the giver and the people who took possession of it. In this covenant, the task was to keep the Torah including maintaining Sabbath as a way of honoring the land.

As Christians, we inherit this understanding of the gift of land. The temptation is to forget that the land is a gift and try to control and manage it as our own. Wendell Berry calls us to remember that we did not create the land, nor do we own it, nor is it a reward for something we have done. This gift of land from the Creator shows the Creator’s love and desire to be in covenant with us. Our response to this gift is to be “faithful, grateful, and humble,” to be neighborly, and to care for it well. The gift of land binds us in covenant with the Creator and to the ultimate fulfillment of the Creator’s work of redeeming and restoring all creation.

This leads us to the future hope that is lived out by Christians in communities of faith together. God’s design as described in the book of Ephesians is “to gather up all things together in Christ” through the church. The cosmic nature of God’s vision includes all of creation, not just humanity. This grand plan is now at work through the church. The church cannot save the earth but it can show in small ways what a ‘saved’ earth might look like. The church is a witness to the coming fulfillment of the reign of God.

The gift of the church is to speak about and make visible God’s creative work. It is the church that can

### **The Eden Leadership Team met on Monday, January 13, 2020**

**ELT Members present:** Jay Goering, Bill Zerger, Becky Koller, Bret Gillmore, Jerry Lankford, Pastor Dianne Schmidt, Marcia Goering, Kenneth L. Stucky, Austin Goering, Berni Kaufman, Joshua Regier, Jean Regier, Candy Unrau

**Lectio Divina devotions:** Ephesians 4: 11-16. Jay lead in prayer.

**Approval of December 9, 2019 Minutes:** These were approved as submitted.

**Budget report:** Austin reported that the total income for 2019 was \$497,000 and total expenses for 2019 was \$487,000—showing a net income of \$10,000. This was the first time we had a positive balance since 2016. Congregational giving was \$25,000 more than last year.

**A. Trustees:** Bill Zerger reported that he will be the chair of the Trustees. Brandon Kaufman will be the secretary and Herb Stucky will be the treasurer. They are looking for possible dates for a church work day. Projects will include window sash installation, cleaning windows, filling dirt around grave sites as needed, inspection of the moveable wall system. Trustee tasks include looking into carpet/new flooring for the fellowship hall area, repair of the fellowship hall moveable wall ceiling areas, review and replace lighting fixtures with LED bulbs. It was brought up that the church signs are need of maintenance. They are reviewing the property insurance policy that reduced coverage against a cyber-attack.

**B. Deacons:** Bret Gillmore reported that they met 1/6/2020. They approved the following roles: Barbara Stucky (Ken) will be chair, Marcia Hiebert will be treasurer, Kathy Neufeld will be secretary, Bret will be ELT rep, Kristen Stucky will be endowment rep. The deacons are making plans to share the new Safe Church

recently met to audit/review financial reports. Austin will be training Fred Schrag to take over as church treasurer. They plan to meet again 2/6/2020.

**D. Worship: Berni Kaufman** reported that Tyler Stucky will serve as chair. JoLene Kaufman will be secretary and Children's Story coordinator. Berni will serve as treasurer and ELT representative. Judy will be Music contact and Cindy Bartell will be committee coordinator. Plans are being made for Lent. Wednesday night meals will begin again on 1/22/2020 and there will be a game night for all ages with Galen and Kathy Waltner in charge. Adult Bible class will begin 1/29/2020. They are still looking for groups to sign up to serve the Wednesday evening meals. Debi Lichti will serve as chair, Sarah Neufeld will be treasurer, Cory Harrison will be secretary, and Marcia Goering will be the ELT representative.

**F. Peace/Witness: Jean Regier** reported that Mark will serve as chair, Shirley Delk will be secretary, Kirby Goering will be treasurer. The refugee backpack project was a success and the MCC office was grateful for the donations. They are working on ideas for Peace Sunday. They will be continuing the baby showers for refugees as needed. The congregation gave good support to our ladies in Voluntary Service.

**G. Pastor Dianne** reported that she and Pastor Derek are making plans for the Leadership Retreat 1/25/2020 from 9-3 at church. Pastor Derek and family are currently in Virginia where Derek is attending leadership training and spending some time with family. There have been three deaths/funerals in recent days—Delbert Stucky, Val Graber, and Jerry Stucky.

**H. Eden Endowment committee.** There was discussion about the operating procedures and policies—such as term expiration dates of committee members and questions about disbursements. Would it be possible to use some of the earnings of this fund for the maintenance and ministry of our church? It was decided to invite

Our omnipresent God shows up in some unexpected places. People have "miraculously" seen Jesus' face on everything from junk food to a rusty water tank. We don't know what Jesus looked like, of course, but Scripture indicates his appearance was rather ordinary: "He had no beauty of majesty to attract us to him" (Isaiah 53:2, NIV).

On one occasion, however, Jesus' face was majestically transformed. At his Transfiguration, observed by many churches on the Sunday before Lent, Jesus' "face shone like the sun, and his clothes became white as light" (Matthew 17:2, ESV). Some disciples witnessed Jesus' glory—which will be ours, thanks to his death and resurrection. As 1 John 3:2 (NIV) promises: When Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is."

Hola, Hello, and Greetings to all,

I wanted to write a quick update to wrap up the year. Thinking about how much has changed in a year is crazy: from being in nursing school, to graduating from college, and now being in Puerto Rico, so many changes. Anyway, back to Puerto Rico, I would say that things are beginning to feel a little more like home around here. I have my days where I am feeling like I am understanding the language a lot better, and then I have others where I feel like I know next to nothing and am very hard on myself. I constantly have to keep reminding myself to step out of my comfort zone and believe that I am good enough. Trying to speak a new language is not easy if you are afraid of making mistakes and sounding dumb. So I have to remind myself to try, and it is okay if I am not great at it, that is why one practices. I am learning to be easier on myself because we are not perfect, but with God we are enough.



I am meeting new people and making stronger relationships with the ones who I see often. For Thanksgiving, my housemate and I went to the Kindergarten teacher's house. She has a husband and two daughters, ages 18 and 11, who we really bonded with. They were so generous with their space, their food, and the love that they had for each other and for God was evident. Meeting people that give generously and outwardly express the love of Christ is so refreshing and overwhelming.

I finally have gotten in the hospital a couple times which has been so great. One of the days I went to the clinic at the hospital and met a doctor who talked about how he was grateful I was there helping, and even if I didn't feel like I was really making a difference, if I only touched one person in a special way that is all that matters. The most important thing is to do the best I can, and to show people I care with the love of God. Let God's will be done. The words of the doctor really hit me hard that day and made me realize that I just need to remember to trust in God and to give my best each and every day. This world needs a lot more people who care and who spread God's love, and we need to do the best we can, wherever we are and with whatever we may have.

At the hospital, I have been shadowing a nurse who speaks English and is super friendly. He is very helpful and lets me do a lot of things, so it has been awesome to work with him and to finally be doing something more in the field that I was trained in. I have been going to the hospital once a week and hopefully will continue to do that in the new year.

As far as the school goes, I have been doing more substitute teaching and helping out wherever is necessary. Some highlights have been that I was a lunch lady for a few days, I have taken the Kindergarten class by myself (there were only 6 students one day when the teacher was gone), and helped aid in the pre-kinder classroom.

Some other highlights and adventures that have happened is that my parents, both grandmas, and uncle and aunt came for a visit over here! It was awesome to show them around so they could learn a little about where I was, what I was doing, and the people that I interact with on a daily basis. I also got to meet a few members of uncle Jeff's family in Puerto Rico. They do not live too far away from me so it was awesome to make that connection-- it is a small world. Matt's uncle and aunt arrived a day before my parents left and I was able to explore more of the island with them. We went to one of the prettiest beaches I have ever seen. It is called Flamenco Beach on the island of Culebra right off of Puerto Rico. We also went to a bioluminescent bay where it looks like the water lights up when you touch it because the organisms in the water light up when they are disturbed. This was super cool and very interesting. Matt's Uncle and Aunt said that before Hurricane Maria the water and organisms would light up a lot more. I have also been to this really neat canyon called San Cristobal Canyon that is not too far away from where we live. There is so much natural beauty all over the island that is amazing and breath-taking. The climate is starting to cool down a little, but nothing like the cold in Kansas. It is very amusing to see people talk about how cold it is when it is only 65/70 degrees because they are not used to the cold like we are.

I think I am going to wrap it up with that. I have been able to be home for Christmas break and see my family and friends and that has been super great! I am looking forward to see what will behold in the New Year. Thanks for all your prayers and support, and thanks to those who have contributed towards my mission trip and supported me during the Christmas season. , I would not be able to do any of this if it were not for all the love and support I receive from Eden, my family, friends, and from God. Thank you for your contribution to Mennonite Disaster Service.

Bolstered by support from donors like you, MDS volunteers have begun major repair and rebuilding work in Marianna, FL. Hurricane Michael made landfall last year, devastating Marianna, a panhandle community of 6,000 people. In weeks and months following the storm MDS volunteers cleared fallen trees from more than 300 properties.

Your gift is putting faith in action by providing hope to those unable to recover on their own. Carl Dube, the volunteer leader in Marianna, reported that when a homeowner learns that MDS will help them, "there is a noticeable change in their faces and words. Seeing the change from despair to hope is a huge blessing.

Signs of hope are evident every week at an MDS worksite. That includes when a crew recently completed a wheelchair ramp for a woman whose life had been severely limited since the hurricane.

"Her smiles and hugs for that crew are a payment that easily surpasses the hours spent on the project," Dube shares.

## What you do:


1. Gently break cracker sheets in half to form squares.
