From the Pastor

The Application Process

There was a time when advertisements on websites would ask you questions about the ad itself, so that the companies could determine which ads would actually be effective for the user. I remember regularly responding that the ad "didn't apply to me." That was ten years ago. Now, online advertisers have realized that they no longer have to ask specifically about a particular ad or

product. Now, they just track your browsing history to know what your interests are, what you've bought in the past, etc. So now, the ads that apply to you find you all on their own. On the one hand, I'm creeped out by the notion that a computer algorithm is watching me so closely. On the other hand, it is really nice to think that I don't have to sit through ads that don't apply to me. It's so much more efficient and satisfying to know that ads will immediately have specific meaning for me and my life.

I think we can all appreciate the ways in which life is increasingly tailored to suit our particular needs and desires. We spend lots of mental energy already as we filter the things we see and read in the news and other media, because we are trying to pick out just those bits of information that actually apply to us. Our brains can really only handle so much information, so it just makes sense that we filter out the stuff that doesn't apply to us and only take in the information that really has meaning for our own lives. This is the challenge of life in the digital age. So, we are grateful when someone else can filter all the other stuff out for us and hand us just the information we really need. Mostly, this shows up in advertising, but I also have encountered it in news feeds that have determined the types of stories that have been of interest to me. The more we get used to being handed only the things that apply to our lives, I wonder how that affects our understanding of the church.

Unfortunately I think the effect is already here. In many stories about people's responses to churches, I've heard about the importance of a church or a sermon that "applies to my life." It seems that the litmus test for a good sermon is if it is directly meaningful for the lives of listeners. So, in some contexts, worship services become focused on practical teaching about how the Bible applies directly to the lives of the congregants. Now, by itself, I don't think this is a bad trend. The Good News of Jesus is good news for the whole world, so of course it is meaningful to all people. The problem, as I see it, is when the application process is removed from the context of a supportive, discerning community.

When Paul writes to the Thessalonian church, he encourages them to not just receive every word of prophecy that comes within the church, but to test it. By this, I believe he means that the community should work together to figure out what God's word means for us, how it applies to our lives. Similarly, Paul encourages the Philippian church to "work out your salvation..." It seems that the ongoing work of faith is to discern together what God's will is for our lives. This is what I believe we do in Sunday school and in Discipleship Groups, which is why I may sound like a broken record at the end of the worship hour when I remind our congregation that our time is not over, but continues in the Sunday school hour. I truly believe we can't have either one of those hours without the other.

In worship, we proclaim the wonderful grace of God. We sing, we read the Holy scriptures, and we pray. In all we do in the worship hour, our focus should be to honor and glorify God. There may be times when a sermon offers some practical examples of what God's goodness means for our lives. But, because our gathered body is so diverse in age, work, experience, etc. the application process must be very general. The sermon will rarely, if ever, be able to offer specific practical application that applies to everyone in the room. This is why we need Sunday school. Sunday school is the opportunity for us to more deeply engage Scripture and begin to make sense of it in our particular daily lives. We can do this far better in a small group, where we can ask deeper questions of each other,

support one another in prayer, and think creatively of what faithful responses might look like in each of our particular contexts.

So, please do not limit your participation in the life of faith to just the worship hour. We need each other to faithfully navigate the world in which we live. Together, our call is to proclaim the glory of God and determine what it means for our daily lives. Let's do both. Together.

The Eden Leadership Team met February 11, 2019 at the Eden Church Office

Members present: Jay Goering, Mark Stucky, Keith Albrecht, Barbara K.

Stucky, Kenneth L Stucky, Jerry Lankford, Becky Koller, Marcia Goering, Josh Regier, Pastor Derek, Bernie Kaufman, and Candy Unrau

Jay Goering lit a candle to symbolize the presence of the Holy Spirit. Members read Eden's Mission and Vision statements together. Jay read scripture from Colossians 1:15-23 in Lectio Divina format. He led the group in prayer.

The January ELT minutes were approved as revised.

Budget report: Austin Goering was unable to attend the meeting, but submitted data which Jay shared with the group. Income: \$35,861.77 Expenses: \$29,863.52 Net: \$5,998.25 He noted that payroll is coming up on 2/15/19 and budget payments will be due at the end of the month.

Commission reports

a. Peace and Witness: Mark Stucky reported that they met 2/6/19 and are planning another baby shower for a refugee family on 2/17/19. They are collecting baby items and also food gifts for this family. He reports that their commission recently referred a community member in need to Helping Hands, a ministry of Associated Ministries. Helping Hands has guidelines to screen potential recipients of assistance, and the Peace/Witness commission plans to give financial support to Helping Hands. The commission is also working on plans for Peace Sunday on April 28. Ben Kreider who works with victim offender prison ministry will be the guest speaker. Mark also reports that two Eden young adults are considering voluntary service assignments.

b. Worship Commission: Berni reported that Peter Goerzen will be the speaker for a community wide Holy Week service April 14 hosted at Eden Church. There will also be a community wide Prayer Walk on April 17 at 4:30 p.m. A Maundy Thursday service will be planned 4/18/19 for Eden only with a simple shared meal and possibly hand washing instead of foot washing. Michael Unruh, executive director of Camp Mennoscah, will speak at our church on a Sunday morning in June, final date to be determined. There will be a Sunday morning service that focuses on gift discernment 9/8/19.

c. Education and Discipleship: Marcia reported that the 2/13/19 meal will be followed by a game night for kids and adults. On Ash Wednesday, there will be no classes, but choirs will meet as usual. On 3/20/19 there will be a service night with the project being making jars of trail mix to be sold at the Kansas Relief Sale.

d. Stewardship: Kenneth reports that they have not met since the leadership retreat, but plan to meet early next month. Some of their goals include to review trends of giving and expenses, and discuss ways to help the congregation keep informed.

e. Deacons: Barbara shared that the deacons met 1/21/19. All were present and responsibilities were reviewed. Bret Gillmore will be chair, Kathy Neufeld will be secretary, Marcia Hiebert will be treasurer, Tim Regehr will be Endowment rep and Barbara is the ELT rep. They are working on the visitation schedule and the upcoming 5th Sunday event.

f. Trustees: Keith reported that they have installed five new soap dispensers in the men's and women's bathrooms. Feedback has been positive. He also reported that they are looking into repairing the floor covering in the men's bathroom. Another upcoming project is improving the driveways up onto 18th Ave. Mark Vogts has agreed to take a look at this. With wet weather this winter and several funerals, the cemetery is a mess. It has been too wet to try to fix the bad areas. They are planning a church work day on March 30th. If the weather is bad that day they will wait until April.

g. Pastor Derek: He reported that January was a big month for Pine Village interaction. We had the Sunday morning worship there, Derek was involved in a Chapel service, and the every other month Wednesday lunch was held in January. He mentioned that visitation was limited at Pine Village due to a quarantine of one hall due to influenza. Pastor Dianne will be returning home and back to church on Sunday 2/17/19.

5. Jay gave a recap of the leadership retreat. He felt that the personality testing was especially helpful and will help in understanding communications styles.

6. Fiber-optic high speed internet access was discussed. Evidently the fiber optic cables from the Moundridge Communication Network come up to the corner of 18th Ave and Cherokee Rd. Installation could be done to give access to the church building with the use of satellite dishes and routers. The additional cost is unknown at this time—but may be as low as \$20 more per month not counting the installation costs. If we had high speed access, we could potentially live stream services, funerals, etc. This would also make Eden more accommodating for hosting conferences. Outreach and evangelism could be enhanced. Other costs may be necessary, such as a new computer equipment, etc. The consensus of the discussion was that we need more information on the costs before we can move forward.

7. There was discussion about cancellation of services for weather. Who makes the decision and how does it get communicated to the congregation? It was discussed that for Sunday morning worship, the decision should be made my pastoral staff in consultation with the deacons and custodian. Wednesday night cancellations should be made by the Christian Education commission with consultation with the choir director and the custodian. The individual calling off service should know how to access the one-call system. For the sake of continuity, would it be best to have the Pastors/church office secretary make the final call?

8. Next ELT meeting will be March 11, 2019 at 7pm at the Eden Church office. Meeting was adjourned. Candace Unrau, secretary


Invitation to Share

Swiss Mennonite Cultural and Historical Association Annual Meeting



Kip Wedel will discuss Anabaptist attitudes toward American civil religion at SMCHA's annual meeting on Sunday, March 10 at First Mennonite Church of McPherson at 2:30 p.m.

Wedel is an associate professor of history at Bethel College, where he teaches courses in

American history, political science, and peace studies. He is a native of McPherson County, completed his PH.D. at Kansas State University, and has taught at Bethel College seven years.

Recently, his article titled "Wrong Kingdom: Why Anabaptist are Suspicious of American Civil Religion" appeared in the book *Civil Religion and American Christianity*, edited by Liam J. Atchison, Keith Bates, and Darin D. Lenz and published by BorderStone Press. An essay by SMCHA member Jim Juhnke appeared in the same volume.

Wedel's article describes why Anabaptists, have traditionally been troubled by civil religion. In his talk on March 10, he will explain what civil religion is, the nature of the Anabaptist case against it, and what he found when he examined one Mennonite church's debate about whether or not to display an American flag on their premises.

On the agenda at the annual meeting will be an overview of the 2018 year, election of SMCHA officers for 2019, and opportunity for members to give counsel and ask questions. The Handbell Choir of First Mennonite Church will provide music. 


