Note from the Pastor

My dad was "that dad" at Christmas. You know, the dad that likes to tease the kids when they're at the height of their expectations. So, he would pretend we weren't getting presents. Or, he would take extra long eating breakfast and drinking his coffee while we waited beside the tree, tortured that we had to wait so long to tear into the gift wrapping. A few times, he pulled that oh-so-funny prank of presenting our gift in a gigantic box, which turned out to be a small gift inside a Russian Doll style progression of smaller and smaller boxes inside the big one. He seemed to have as much fun watching our reactions to his antics as he did in giving gifts.

Guess what? I get it now. I like doing it to my kids, too. I'm "that dad." I think it's because I like to see the discomfort of delayed gratification and subverted expectations. It's sick, I know. So, to make up for it, I try to put myself in a place of delayed gratification and subverted expectations: I read the Bible.

Especially at Christmas, it feels like we know the Bible stories related to Jesus's birth by heart. So, it can feel like there's not much new or much to learn. Yet, every time I go back, I notice something new. Did you realize that Matthew spends a whole lot of time showing Jesus's family connection to Abraham through Joseph, only for it to be clear that he's not really biologically from that line? I don't know if I saw that before, but it certainly felt more powerful this year as I saw how God worked through adoption and reflected on how much adoption has been a part of my extended family.

Most of us know the very basic outline of the story of Jesus. But, in the coming year, let's dig into his story with patience, opening one box at a time, as slow and frustrating as it might be. May we learn the delayed gratification. May Jesus subvert our expectations by showing us things about himself that we hadn't noticed before.

Eden Leadership Team

The Eden Leadership Team met on December 14.

JoLene Kaufman representing the Worship Commission reported that Becky Setser will survey choir members in January to see how much willingness members have to expand the current ensemble or possibly resume choirs. She also shared that they have reached the dollar goal for the number of hymnals they plan to purchase. They are currently on back order, so we will continue to store the hymnals we have on carts to be picked up and returned back to the carts after each service. They are also planning to involve children in greeting or handing out bulletins in the new year.

Matt Schrag, representing the trustees shared that the cost of the new boilers was a bit higher than expected because they had to add a sequencer to rotate the load from boiler to boiler. The HVAC system can now be controlled remotely by computer. The trustees have decided to move forward with the carpeting project, possibly in stages. A 2/3 majority congregational vote will be required to use funds rom the Capital Building Fund for this project.

Deacon representative, Barbara Stucky shared that the deacons got together for a Christmas dinner and plan to have the same officers for the coming year. Barb's term on deacons has ended and Jenny Schrag will be the new deacon.

Marcella Schrag shared that the Education/ Discipleship Commission plans to begin Bible Study on Wednesday nights beginning January 12 and they are looking to re-start the mentoring program.

The SEEDS class has now become two separate classes due to increased size.

Pastor Dianne shared she has been spending time with funeral planning and caring for families. She recently attended a webinar from MC USA in preparation for the KC conference planned for May 27, 28, and 29. She has also been working on the Leadership Retreat planned for January 8.

Pastor Derek has also been involved with multiple funerals. He expressed gratitude to share

this load with a two-pastor team. He recognizes that it takes a concerted effort of many people to make this funeral ministry possible, including the pie makers, kitchen workers, ushers, sound operators, musicians, etc.

The Year-end celebration will be held February 6, 2022. There will be a potluck meal. The blessing of those elected and appointed to church committees will be held in early January.

The pastoral review process has been delayed due to a shortage of facilitators.

MC USA conference May 27-30, 2022 in Kansas City. Eden can send 4 adult delegates and 1 youth delegate.

A new battery is needed for the defibrillator at the church building. Matt will obtain quotes for this. There was discussion of the possibility of having a training session on use of the defibrillator at the Leadership Training. JoLene reported the first aid kit has been restocked with supplies.

Concern was brought up about the masking policy. There was discussion about communication and being sensitive to the various needs and opinions of the church members and those visiting our church. We will continue to strive to follow the county guidelines for mitigation of the spread of COVID-19.


